1. Assumptions and goals of the conference.

For many years the transatlantic Alliance was the heart of Europe's security architecture, critical to managing crises. Today's security threats are certainly serious and they can not be solved without effective transatlantic cooperation. After opening of this new era of strategic competition with Russia, *the North Atlantic Treaty Organization* faces two problems in the East. First problem is that, the concept of deterrence has been somewhat neglected in 21st-century conflicts, so that the the atomic umbrella under Art. 5 of the Washington Treaty seems to be useless. The second problem revolves round the military sphere. Regional security is largely defined by Russian local superiority, which was enhanced in the past decade. Russia has been widely modernising its armed forces, increasing their readiness, and beefing up its presence along NATO borders. Moreover the annexation of the Crimea have reduced the NATO's ability to deter and defend, and revealed the need for allies to beef up defenses. But the process of strengthening the alliance's Eastern flank is far from over. To complete it, NATO needs to develop a long-term strategy toward Russia based on unity and deterrence.

International conference on "Security of the Central-Eastern Europe's countries in the context of strengthening the of NATO'S Easter flank" aims to bring together leading academic scientists, researchers and research scholars to exchange and share their experiences and research results on all aspects of security of Central and Eastern European countries in the context of the situation in Ukraine, as well as the necessity to strengthen the North Atlantic Alliance on the Eastern flank. All honorable authors are kindly encouraged to contribute to and help shape the conference through submissions of their research abstracts, papers.

- The eastern flank of the North Atlantic Alliance as one of the key issues for European security;

- NATO's activity in the Eastern Europe;

- Poland as a leader on the eastern flank of NATO;

- The eastern flank and the resolution of the NATO summit in Warsaw;

- Political and military cooperation of the eastern flank countries.

• An annexation of Crimea by Russia as a contribution to strengthening NATO's Eastern flank.

- Perception by the NATO countries of the annexation of Crimea and events in the Eastern Ukraine.

- The Project of reconstruction of the security system in the Central and Eastern Europe region, especially in the context of the situation in Ukraine.
